The introductory essay by Saúl Sosnowski, a prominent professor of Latin American literature, author, and Jewish culture expert, is followed by the first section of studies which focuses on the early reception of Kafka's work in this region. It begins with a persuasive contribution to the search for the translator of "The Metamorphosis" (1925), as its translation into Spanish has been wrongly attributed to Borges. The largest part of the book focuses on specific Latin American writers, both world-renowned (J. J. Arreola, R. Bolaño, N. Parra and others) and lesser known, and their relationship to Kafka. Some studies touch on the political context or the links between Kafka's work and the style of magic realism. The last chapter describes the interest in Kafkaesque inspiration among the Latin American writers of the 21<sup>st</sup> century, which is, surprisingly, very strong. With this issue, the *World of Literature* magazine continues its long-standing edition of special issues published in foreign languages.
